Inaugural International Occupational Science Think Tank

19 - 22 July, 2006

The Think Tank is an "invitation only" event convened by the Australasian Occupational Science Centre (AOSC) http://shoalhaven.uow.edu.au/aosc.html. Numbers are restricted to a maximum of 20 people, representing the International Society of Occupational Science, the Society for the Study of Occupation: USA, Occupation UK & Ireland, the Australasian Society of Occupational Science, the Canadian Society of Occupational Scientists, the WFOT International Advisory Group Occupational Science, the Journal of Occupational Science, and recognized scholars in the field of occupational science. Included among the participants will be 3 facilitators who are neither occupational therapists nor occupational scientists. They will contribute perspectives on social policy, public health and political science respectively.

The aims of the Think Tank are:

- 1. to develop an occupational science research agenda
- 2. to establish international networks with individuals and institutions for future collaborative occupational science research
- 3. to promote an international voice for occupational scientists through strengthening the structure and roles of the International Society of Occupational Scientists (ISOS)

There will be 3 sessions on each day of the Think Tank. All sessions will be informal and conducted in a relaxed setting. The sessions will involve large and small group discussions. The facilitators will participate in all discussions. An experienced writer will attend each session.

The outcome of the Think Tank will be a White Paper produced by the writer. The White Paper will reflect the collective position and state the recommendations of the Think Tank participants.

In the months following the Think Tank, participants will be able to share this White Paper with their respective organizations for comment and feedback. Subsequent dialogue between Think Tank participants to finalize the White Paper will be electronic.

Once completed, the White paper will be posted on relevant websites and list servers, and published in the Journal of Occupational Science.

An additional outcome will be a Green Paper prepared by a small working party comprised of Think Tank participants. The Green Paper will outline a strategic plan to

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implement the recommendations contained in the White Paper. A draft program for the Think Tank is included at the end of this letter.

Venue

The Think Tank will be held at the Shoalhaven Campus of the University of Wollongong http://shoalhaven.uow.edu.au. The campus is situated in Nowra, on the south coast of New South Wales, Australia. Nowra is approximately a 2 ½ hour drive south of Sydney, and 2 ½ hour drive north east of Canberra.

Transport Arrangements

On Wednesday 19 July, participants will be met at Sydney Airport or at a Sydney motel and then transported by road from Sydney to Nowra. Once out of the city environs, they will travel on a very scenic route down the south coast.

Participants will be transported back to Sydney by road on Saturday 22 July.

Accommodation

Participants will be accommodated in 4 cottages at the Shoalhaven Lodge www.shoalhavenlodge.com.au, which is in a bush setting on the banks of the Shoalhaven River. Kangaroos, wombats, and native birds abound. The Lodge is a 5 minute drive to the Shoalhaven Campus. Single, double and shared rooms are available.

Meals

A continental breakfast is provided by the Lodge. All other meals will be catered. Special diets will not be a problem.

Costs

AOSC is covering the cost of participants' transport from Sydney to Nowra and return, as well as their meals and accommodation from the evening of Wednesday, 19 July 2006 to the afternoon of Saturday 22 July 2006.
